

Overview of the Environmental Protection Agency

- EPA Established in 1993.
- Operates independently, under the aegis of the Department of Communications, Climate Action and the Environment.
- Initially focused on licensing of industrial and waste activities as well as environmental monitoring, reporting, and research.
- Since 1993 over 60 further statutory instruments and regulations assigning additional responsibilities including Urban Waste Water since 2007.



Regulation of Urban Waste Water Discharges







EPA Regulatory Activity


- Licence, monitor, and audit waste water discharges. (2016: 185 monitoring visits and 96 audits)
- Take enforcement action, including court actions, targeting priority environmental issues (13 cases to date).
- Publish annual public enforcement reports on urban waste water quality.
- EPA's regulatory objectives (for waste water compliance) are set by EU Directives, including;
 - Urban Waste Water Directive and
 - the Water Framework Directive.



EPA Annual Reports on Urban Waste Water








Comparison of Ireland to EU Average for Compliance

Compliance with mandatory urban waste water treatment requirements assessed by national treatment load





EPA Enforcement Priorities

- 127 areas are the focus of EPA's priority actions.
- Of these, **27** areas are part of the EU infringement case.
- The remainder of the EPA priority areas include;
 - 38 areas discharging untreated waste water
 - 34 areas linked with a high degree of probability to river pollution.
 - 16 areas where waste water was not treated to the required standards
 - 15 areas where improvements are required to protect pearl mussels.
 - 3 areas where discharges contribute to poor quality bathing waters
 - 3 areas where disinfection is required to protect shellfish waters.
 - 3 areas are linked with other environmental risks
