- current beef prices are in the €3.75-€3.85 per kilogram range, which is below the cost of production;
- suckler farmers continue to depend on Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) direct payments for their livelihoods, with average incomes just below €13,000 according to Teagasc;
- there are 951,397 suckler cows kept on 66,069 Irish farms;
- 90 per cent of all beef produced on Irish farms is exported, with total beef exports worth €2.4 billion in 2018;
- Brexit poses one of the biggest ever threats to the beef sector for suckler farmers, exporters and related jobs, with 50 per cent of all beef exports going to the United Kingdom (UK);
- a no deal Brexit would be catastrophic for the Irish beef sector with World Trade Organization tariffs of 70 per cent on exports entering the UK which would result in an additional €780 million cost, while the price of beef produced by farmers would fall to an estimated €2.50 per kilogram;
- only 13 per cent of Irish beef exports went to non-European Union (EU) countries in 2018;
- Ireland has just three agricultural attachés stationed in embassies outside Europe currently, while Bord Bia has offices in five countries outside of the EU to grow market share for Irish beef produce;
- the Beef Forum has become a talking shop and failed to deliver on commitments entered into for farmers, including the introduction of a market index for price transparency;
- insufficient urgency has been shown by the Government to address the lairage capacity issue flagged last year that is constraining the live export of calves to the continent;
- farmers have lost faith in the Quality Pricing System (QPS) grid; and
- the Government has failed to adequately promote and incentivise the uptake of Producer Organisations (POs) in the beef sector resulting in zero registrations with the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine since a legal basis was given to POs in 2016;

further notes:

- how recent comments by the Taoiseach regarding meat consumption have greatly angered beef farmers across the country and undermined commitments in the Programme for a Partnership Government, as well as Bord Bia’s ongoing work to promote Irish beef produce in markets abroad;
- that the Brexit Loan Scheme for farmers, fishermen and food businesses announced in October 2017 has still to open 17 months on; and

— that the Government has signed off at EU level to permit 70,000 additional tons of South American beef into Europe for EU-MERCOSUR negotiations; and

calls on the Government to:

- immediately request Brexit mitigation funding for farmers, specifically exceptional and market disturbance aid for beef and other vulnerable sectors under Article 219 of the CAP Common Market Organisation Regulation;
- seek relaxation of State aid ceilings in order to increase the grant aid permissible to safeguard exposed exporting enterprises and associated jobs from Brexit in the agri-food sector;
- work with Bord Bia, livestock exporters and French authorities to deliver enhanced lairage capacity at Cherbourg Port in order to increase the live export of calves;
- deliver a fully funded, fair, and simpler CAP post 2020 that safeguards direct payments with measures to directly support all low-income farm sectors, including the beef sector;
- introduce a beef market index for price transparency as committed to under the Beef Forum and examine the feasibility with stakeholders of requiring processors to report wholesale prices on a regular basis;
- increase farmer transparency and introduce more robust measures around carcass trim and grading, including publishing details of on-the-spot fines for factories breaching EU carcass trimming rules;
- strengthen the position of the primary producer in the food supply chain and transpose EU Directive (2018/0082) on unfair trading practices into Irish law swiftly, which should be enforced by an independent authority;
- consult with stakeholders and tackle any barriers associated with setting up beef POs;
- protect the beef sector and suckler farmers in all upcoming EU trade deals and reject increased beef access in any potential agreement with South American MERCOSUR countries;
- secure additional funding in the next CAP programme to achieve a suckler cow support payment of €200 per cow;
- work with stakeholders to ensure all animals which come from a quality assured farm should receive some level of bonus payment;

- illicit drugs like opium and cocaine are booming and new drugs like fentanyl are emerging as a major drug problem;
- the European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction’s Early Warning System for new drugs monitored 670 new psychoactive substances by the end of 2017, up from 300 in 2013;
- cannabis remains the world’s most commonly used drug, with 192 million people using it in 2018;
- in the European Union (EU), over 92 million people have used illicit drugs; and
- drug markets continue to be the most significant illegal market in the EU, with over 33 per cent of organised criminal groups involved in the production, trafficking and supply of illicit drugs;

further notes that:

- over 26 per cent (more than one in four) of the Irish population have used illicit drugs, with cannabis the most widely used;
- our communities are now coping with an increasingly complex and chaotic drug problem that includes prescription drugs, illegal drugs, new psychoactive substances, high-strength cannabis, crack cocaine, crystal meth and ketamine, and widespread availability and misuse of alcohol continues to be a core part of the polydrug problem;
- 695 people died from drug-related causes in 2015, and there has been a 61 per cent increase in drug-related deaths between 2004 and 2015 and drug-related deaths are 3.5 times higher than road deaths; and
- insidious, ongoing day-to-day related intimidation is being experienced in our communities, and in 2015 less than ten per cent of people experiencing intimidation reported it to An Garda Síochána for fear of reprisal;

calls on the Taoiseach’s department to appoint a senior official to the National Drugs Strategy’s (NDS) national structures to ensure direct accountability of all agencies at national, regional and local level for their active participation in implementing the new NDS; and

calls on the Government to:

- implement its own Programme for Government commitment through the immediate allocation of an emerging needs fund to the task forces to support community drug projects in the delivery of services that can respond to current and emerging service gaps in communities;

- commit to a clear timetable for prompt implementation of the Public Health (Alcohol) Act 2018 without further delay;
- accelerate the work of the Garda asset profilers targeting people making significant sums of money from the drug trade living in our communities;
- ensure that the new scheme proposed in the NDS for young people is developed through a partnership approach involving youth services, schools, and community drug projects;
- conclude the work of the working group on alternative approaches to criminalisation and end the criminalisation for personal use;
- strengthen the community voice across all levels of the NDS and make immediate investment in community leadership and participation programmes;
- acknowledge the relationship between addiction and mental health and commit to greater co-operation between the relevant agencies, as considered in ‘A Vision for Change’ and the NDS; and
- cease the Health Service Executive reviews of drug and alcohol task forces, with immediate effect, as these reviews are being carried out without any discussion or consultation with the national NDS committees that are responsible for supporting and monitoring the task forces, and it is incompatible with the interagency partnership approach that underlies the NDS for one agency to carry out a review and present it as *a fait accompli*.” — *Joan Collins, Maureen O’Sullivan, Thomas P. - the Dublin Airport Authority (DAA) is now planning for up to 50 million plus passengers per annum at Dublin Airport alone;

further notes that:

- EU Directives, planning conditions and environmental impact studies have developed over the past 20-25 years, leading to stricter noise conditions being imposed on developments by airports;
- Dublin Airport runway 10R 28L currently has night flights and with a planning

condition for no night flights to take place on the new northern runway 10L 28R, all night flights would be directed onto the older runway;

- over 250 European airports, including London Heathrow and Frankfurt, have longstanding restrictions on night flights;
- homes recording noise levels of 63 decibels are to be offered insulation and those affected by 69 decibels are to be offered relocation via a voluntary buy-out scheme;
- the community of St. Margaret's The Ward and St. Margaret's received a level of insulation for their homes and schools following a public period of negotiation with the then Aer Rianta, and this level of insulation has not been reviewed or upgraded since;
- the new northern runway and indeed the existing runway have impacted and will impact further on the value of the properties within certain noise contours, and will also impact on the health of the residents and the environment of the local communities; and
- local residents believe, however that the economic importance of Dublin Airport and the necessity for growth can co-exist with the local community, with proper insulation and sound barrier technologies installed, reasonable noise controls and a voluntary buy-out scheme for those who decide they need to leave; and

calls on the Government to:

- restrict air travel between the hours of 11.30 p.m. and 5 a.m. on all runways;
- instruct the Environmental Protection Agency to carry out independent noise pollution investigations in a selection of homes affected by noise pollution from runway 10R 28L and the proposed new northern runway 10L 28R;
- examine European best practice for insulation and ensure that all homes receive this level of support;
- ensure that the homes affected by the older 10R 28L runway are provided with the same level of insulation as the homes affected by the new northern runway 10L 28R;
- direct the DAA and other airport authorities to offer either improved insulation or a voluntary buy-out scheme to those homes affected, and for insulation and the voluntary buy-out option to be reviewed/upgraded every 5-7 years; and

- Section 39 organisations are in agreement with staff and unions that pay restoration is due to staff as per the Lansdowne Road Agreement (Public Sector Stability Agreement 2018-2020) but, in general, they are unable to meet these increased pay demands from their own restricted funds;
- the Labour Court recommendation LCR21609 on 20th November, 2017, between the Irish Wheelchair Association (IWA) and the Services, Industrial, Professional and Technical Union (SIPTU) confirmed the alignment between the IWA pay scales and the HSE;
- the Labour Court recommendation LCR21609 on 20th November, 2017, also criticised the HSE’s administrative requirement for the IWA and SIPTU to engage in the industrial relations process;
- industrial action is due to take place across Section 39 services on 18th September, having been deferred since February to allow for talks;
- funding has still not been provided to Section 39 organisations to restore pay in line with HSE pay rates;
- delays are merely increasing the amounts due to staff incrementally and creating distress and unease for staff and services;
- due to lack of pay restoration, Section 39 organisations find themselves under extreme pressure in relation to recruitment and retention of staff; and
- the work of Section 39 organisations and their staff is of importance, and that industrial action for the large numbers of vulnerable service-users would be a catastrophe; and

calls on the Government to:

- immediately implement the motion as passed by Dáil Éireann on 17th January, 2018, calling for restoration of pay for staff of Section 39 organisations; and
- instruct the HSE to immediately provide the additional funding to the Section 39 organisations found in the HSE report, of which a copy was submitted to the Government on 11th June, 2018, to meet pay restoration obligations to staff.” — *Thomas P. - following the recent decision by An Post to circulate retirement packages to hundreds of postmasters and postmistresses, 159 have elected to take their well-deserved retirements;
- it is An Post's intention that wherever a postmaster or postmistress has elected to retire, that post office will close, leaving communities without access to critical post office services;
- other European countries have already extended Public Service Obligation (PSO) payments for the purpose of maintaining post office outlets in areas where they would be otherwise financially unviable; and
- the proposed changes to a 15 kilometre radius will place an intolerable burden on the elderly and most vulnerable in our communities, particularly those without access to private or public transport; and

calls on the Government to:

- guarantee the current An Post network to ensure that all citizens of Ireland have access to this important service by introducing a new PSO payment for post offices, based on models in the United Kingdom;
- immediately roll out new services, as recommended by the Post Office Network Business Development Group and An Post's own strategy, to ensure the financial viability of the entire An Post network; and

agrees that membership of the new, one-year Citizens' Assembly will consist of:

- a chairperson, to be appointed by An Taoiseach;
- a minimum of 66 citizens, randomly selected so as to be broadly representative of Irish society and who are entitled to vote in a referendum and in local authority elections;
- one member from each of the political parties of the Northern Ireland Assembly;
- one member appointed by each political party/grouping of the Oireachtas; and
- substitutes, who may be appointed by each political party/grouping, and who will be entitled to full participation rights, including the right to vote; and

further agrees that:

- the Citizens' Assembly-

commends the whistleblowers who have highlighted this matter and undertaken research in order to determine relevant facts in relation to the impact of lack of appropriate health and safety on Air Corps personnel;

calls on the Government to:

- commit to putting in place and maintaining full training, personal protective equipment and ventilation in order to minimise the risks to Air Corps personnel of toxic chemical exposure;
- outline the steps it intends to take to address the concerns raised by whistleblowers and ensure the highest possible standards of health and safety for Air Corps personnel; and
- put in place measures, including medical cards, to address the health needs of personnel that have been exposed to hazardous chemicals, and extend these measures to any civilians affected and to students who may be affected while on work experience; and

- it is estimated that 90,000 to 180,000 people are affected by fibromyalgia in Ireland;
- fibromyalgia is a debilitating condition, with chronic pain and fatigue being the primary features;

- there are no nationwide specialist facilities or comprehensive treatments available;
- those living with fibromyalgia have encountered difficulties when trying to access social welfare, and instead of getting vital support at a crucial juncture in their illness, they are being refused and stigmatised, and as a result experience stress;
- the condition is significantly misunderstood; and
- the majority of those affected by fibromyalgia are women, at a ratio of 6:1;

agrees that:

- a national registry of the chronic pain syndromes and clinical guidelines for different types of chronic pain, as per the International Classification of Diseases codes and International Association for the Study of Pain – World Health Organization (WHO) guidelines, be drawn up to assist medical practitioners to better understand different types of chronic pain syndromes and to be able to differentiate according to WHO international guidelines;
- the delivery of care is limited by the lack of commitment to the diagnosis and treatment of fibromyalgia in addition to the deficiencies in resources currently available in community, primary and secondary care;
- the delivery of care is also hampered by the absence of clear guidelines for management, and the lack of opportunity to develop integrated care pathways across primary and secondary care;
- many people with fibromyalgia suffer from chronic pain;
- access to psychological therapies is a paramount need in health service development, together with improved access to all multidisciplinary health treatments;
- patient education and self-care is a vital aspect of management of fibromyalgia and optimal benefits are obtained when sufferers acquire skills in helping reregulation of the autonomic nervous system and other systems as well as pain and stress management skills;
- access to a recognised pain programme and pain psychologist, autogenic training, mindfulness and yoga can be especially helpful as part of comprehensive cognitive behavioural therapies, as well as appropriate exercise to improve mobility and function together with dietary adjustment, and in some cases the person with fibromyalgia is able to return to work;
- fibromyalgia should be recognised as a disability by the State for people with severe symptoms who have the condition on a long-term basis and which has proved unresponsive to interventions, and in these cases alternative treatments such as access to medicinal cannabis should be explored, and access to medicinal cannabis through the Cannabis Access Programme should be considered; and
- reliance on opioid based medicines is not desirable; and

calls on the Government to:

- establish an effective and sustainable model of care to diagnose, manage and treat fibromyalgia;
- bring an end to prescription charges;
- reduce/remove the monthly limit on the cost of medications for non-medical card holders;

- develop a model of care based on international best practice;
- implement a strategy to set up a framework where those living with fibromyalgia and myalgic encephalomyelitis (ME) are clearly recognised;
- conduct a review of the long-term illness scheme, as it has not been updated since 1970 (49 years ago);
- carry out a dedicated and rigorous review of the underlying causes of the condition; and
